Roald Dahl was born in 1916, in Wales to Norwegian immigrant parents. During his life he was an ace fighter pilot, a spy, a chocolate historian and a medical inventor. Dahl didn't start writing until after he was married with children when he wrote 17 children's novels and 20 books for children plus some for adults too. Gobblefunk is his own language, the words are found across his literature and explain meaning when Dahl's dream world transcends normal adjectives. Often in Dahl's work he gives the message that children are often more intelligent than they are given credit for.
