Boris Johnson



CASTLES

England is known for many castles it has had over the years. They were often of similar designs which included different features.



Battlements – additional pieces of stone at the top of the castle walls. This allowed the men to fire arrows or drop heavy objects on any enemies.

Moat – a body of water surroudning the castle. This made it very difficult for enemies to reach the castles.

Arrow Loops – slight gaps in the walls. These allowed arrows to be fired without exposure, protecting themselves and defeating the enemies.

Tower – a tall column part of the castle. This allowed the lookouts to see when enemies were arriving. They could also shoot arrows or drop objects from the tall height of the tower.

Drawbridge – a wooden bridge that can be in a upright or down position. The drawbridge could be raised to stop any invaders entering the castle.
