Every couple of years, pupils will receive multiple opportunities to visit new places by going on trips. In year four, pupils will visit Hatterpiece - to learn swimming and other skills.

What are the different house classes?

As children begin their adventure at the academy, these new pupils will be assigned to a house class. The house system is a good way to celebrate children's good quality in their work by giving out house tokens, provided by the leaders of the different coloured houses. These groups

are named after famous authors - as well as each group having a main positive characteristic to focus on. Altogether, there are four houses:

- Rowling (blue house) focuses on resilience;
- Blyton (yellow house) represents collaboration;
- Dahl (green house) celebrates the characteristic of respect;
- Tolkien (red house) work around determination.

If you are a book-lover like the students at Croftby, you are bound to recognise these names.

Are there opportunities for pupils to participate in drama and performances?

Each year group will have an opportunity to perform their drama and singing skills, as well as to show their confidence by participating in a sort of production each year. Members of drama clubs (such as NAPA) visit our academy in order to help out when it comes to productions. Members may also teach children different songs to sing in a performance with another year group. Drama lessons can also commence in different classes.
