




Foundation stage:

Children can begin to combine words to make sentences.




Children can begin to combine words to sequence sentences to form a short description


Children can sequence sentences to compose longer descriptions.




Children can compose longer descriptions, beginning to add detail to different aspects of the character.




Children can develop character descriptions to include all aspects of a character's personality and appearance.




Children further develop longer character description and begin to use a range of vocabulary and devices to engage the reader.






<u>**y**6:</u>
