


Either:

Show your photographs and written work to your teacher.





Watching / Listening

If your local theatre is putting on something similar, perhaps you could persuade your parents to take you.








Family

Write a short paragraph about your character to show to your teacher.








Find the radius and diameter of three different circles in your home environment.


Using a TV Guide, make up a quiz for a member of your family to try. Example questions might include:

Bring in your quiz to show your teacher.












Write a letter to your MP about a local issue. Perhaps you might consider the following:

Show your work to your teacher.












Draw a diagram of a plant and label it with the words pistil, anther and sepal. Remember to use a sharp pencil.


Take a trip to the beach. Make a list of all the animals that you see.


When you return, use the Internet to help you to create a fact file for each one and illustrate your work with photographs or sketches of the animals.


With your family's help, keep a food diary for a week. Note down what you eat for every meal, and any snacks that you may enjoy during the week.




Family

Talk to a relative about where they have been on holiday. Find it on a world map or by using Google Earth.


Capture your conversation with your relative in the form of an interview and show it to your teacher.












Use the Internet to find out about the life of an historical figure associated with the country whose language you are studying.

Did you recognise any words?











Enjoy your dish and write a few sentences about it this tasting experience to show to your teacher.

Take photographs or sketches and create a fact file about its history after having read the information about it at the museum or gallery. You may want to supplement this information with extra research from books/the Internet.


Show your fact file to your teacher.

Write a review, explaining the differences presented by each film.



Banksy is a very famous British street artist. What can you find out about him and his style of painting?


Complete some research and write a short fact file to show your teacher.

Try to make sure that your drawing has convincing scale, depth, texture and tone.




Watching / Listening

Enjoy an episode of The Big Painting Challenge (BBC iPlayer).


Write a short commentary on the programme, explaining which techniques were explored and what you have learned from the episode.

Show your work to your teacher.










Have a look at the gears on a bike. Can you explain how they work?

Write a paragraph to explain what you have found out and show it to your teacher.




Watching / Listening

Design a poster to show these and show it to your teacher.








Family

Show your work to your teacher.




Family

Share your work with your teacher.



The music is built over an ostinato rhythm played on one or more snare drums throughout the piece. Listen out for this.


Try to work out the story being told in the ice dance, and present it in a short paragraph for your teacher.












'justice'? Make sure that you have an accurate definition (a dictionary would be helpful) and then write a paragraph describing your hopes and dreams for justice in the world.

Share your work with your teacher.




Visits / Out And About

You could illustrate your trail with drawings, photographs, pictures cut from brochures or prints from the Internet.


Bring your trail to school to show your teacher.




