









Enjoy reading a book by Roger Hargreaves (Mr Men and Little Miss books) or by W.A. Awdry (Thomas the Tank Engine books).

Watch a film that you enjoy. What is the main problem that the characters face?


Talk to your teacher about it.






Re-tell one of your favourite stories or memories to a member of your family.


Be prepared to tell it to your teacher too.












Look for as many different 2D and 3D shapes around your home as possible.

Visit a shop with an adult and work out the total of three items. What note would you use to pay for them?


Tell your teacher about your shopping trip.

Show your timetable to your teacher.






It will help you to solve multiplication problems using arrays.

Discuss what steps will need to be taken to achieve these goals and tell your teacher all about it.






Talk to your teacher about what you have found out.

Make a list to show your teacher.




Family

Show your work to your teacher.






Perhaps you could try one of these experiments yourself. Tell your teacher what you have learned.

Tell your teacher the names of the five oceans of the world.






With the help of a grown-up from your family, think carefully about how you get to school. Make a simple map of this route together to show your teacher.

Try to include at least three landmarks on your map eg. church/post box/shop/park/pub.


Show the map to your teacher.

Watching / Listening



Talk to your teacher about what you have found out.














William Morris was a very famous English artist who designed many patterns for textiles and wallpapers. Ask an adult to help you to look at some images of his wallpaper designs.

Draw something that you can see in your garden, back yard or local area. It could be a tree, flower, a building or something else.


Try to make your drawing very recognisable, with some rendering.

Paint a picture of a family member.


Try to apply your paint accurately and consistently. Try to include some highlights and lowlights to give your painting some depth.



Watching / Listening


Watch an episode of Mister Maker on YouTube. Tell your teacher about what you have watched.

Tell your teacher all about it.




Watching / Listening

Use the Internet to watch a short film/clip about 'Simple Robotics'.


Be prepared to talk to your teacher about what you have found out.












Ask an adult up to help you to find out what is meant by repetition in music.

Do you recognise any of the pieces of music?


Tell your teacher all about it.

Ask a family member to write a very brief review of your performance to show your teacher.




Watching / Listening

Can you feel and hear when the 12 bar pattern starts and finishes?


Talk to your teacher about it.












Find out about two different creation stories by looking in a book or by watching a film/tv show or by using the Internet.

Make some quick sketches of one or two of these items to show your teacher.




Family


Tell your teacher what you have found out.












Can you find out five events in the summer Olympics and five events in the winter Olympics?
