SMART

The internet is a brilliant place to learn and explore, just remember to always be **SMART!**

S IS FOR SAFE
Never give out personal information to strangers on the internet. Personal information includes things like your home address and your birthday.

M IS FOR MEET
Never ever meet up with a stranger you have met online unless a parent or guardian has said it is ok and is present. Never, never, never, never, never.

A IS FOR ASK
Don't click on links from people you don't know without asking an adult, they could contain viruses. If you get a strange email from a friend and you think they might have a virus make sure you let them know!

R IS FOR REAL
Don't believe everything you read online, check your facts! Is it real? Did you read it on a reliable website? Are other websites saying the same thing? Does it tell you where they got the information from?

I IS FOR TELL
If you have an online safety problem, make sure you tell someone. Tell a parent, guardian, or teacher as soon you can.

PRIVACY

There are some things we must keep private when we go online.

We should keep these things private:

- Password
- Home address
- Telephone number
- Bank account details

Some people might know your password, like your teacher or your grown-ups, but it should be something you keep private. This is so people cannot go onto your account.

TELL

Sometimes we can click on things by mistake when we are on the internet. If we do this, it is important to tell a grown-up who can help.

WEBSITES



Make sure you only go on the website or app your teacher has told you to go on. These are reliable sites that we can trust.

FRIEND REQUESTS

Playing games with your friends online can be super fun. However, not everyone is who they say they are online. Make sure you know that it is really your friend you are playing with. You could ask them in person to check that is their username. Never accept a friend request from someone you do not know.
