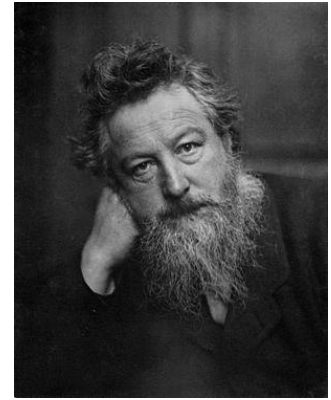




# WILLIAM MORRIS
